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FOREWORD

The UNHCR estimated that by the end of 2023, the number of people forcibly displaced exceed 117.3 million for the first time in recorded history. This includes over 31.6 million refugees under UNHCR's mandate and an additional 6 million Palestinian refugees.

The work of HOST International Aotearoa New Zealand[1] (HOST) is more important than ever, and we were delighted to welcome the first sponsored refugees in the Community Refugee Sponsorship programme to Aotearoa New Zealand.

Our commitment to supporting the settlement of former refugees and migrants is rooted in our mission to bring humanity, hope, and dignity to individuals from refugee and migrant backgrounds and to find innovative solutions that help them settle and find tūrangawaewae, or sense of place and belonging, in Aotearoa New Zealand.

We were privileged to collaborate closely with tangata whenua, particularly Te Ati Awa in Te-Whanganui-a-tara, Wellington, following a haka powhiri in June 2023.

We continued to forge partnerships with communities and sector partners while participating in various alliances and networks to strengthen our advocacy efforts. This collaboration is essential for our mission to build strong communities, focusing on coaching and co-design methodologies to guide and inform our practice.

David Keegan stepped down as Board Chair and remains a member of the Board of Directors. Mai Tamimi, MNZM, was appointed as the new Board Chair. In 2023, we welcomed Jay Hikuleo Ikiua as our Kaiārahi Cultural Advisor to the team.

In January 2024, HOST in Australia entered voluntary administration, and HOST in Aotearoa New Zealand became an independent charity. We continue to collaborate closely with HOST in Malaysia and Thailand.

We developed a new strategy, focusing on individual wellbeing, community inclusion, and systems change through capacity building for ethnic communities, community refugee sponsorship, and addressing barriers to digital inclusion and employment.

This Annual Report provides a summary of our activities undertaken throughout 2023/24.

We extend our gratitude to the team -Giselle Iradukunda, Steph Oh, Jay Ikiua, Juan Isaza, our exceptional advisor Don Hunter, Board members, volunteers, and partners – who have contributed to our mission and shared our vision of making a difference in the lives of individuals from refugee and migrant backgrounds. COMMUNITY REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP

The first sponsored refugee on the Community Refugee Sponsorship (CORS) visa arrived in Aotearoa New Zealand in August 2023. Since then, 151 refugees have been approved, with 101 arriving and welcomed by 28 Approved Sponsor groups across the North and South Islands.

Several sponsored refugees have enrolled in further tertiary study, some have found employment while others are continuing their English language learning.



COMMUNITY REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP

As the umbrella organisation for the Community Refugee Sponsorship (CORS) programme, HOST continued implementing the extended pilot in collaboration with Immigration New Zealand, the programme's funding partner.

We also continued providing coaching, guidance, and training to Approved Sponsor groups.

A Mana Ako training programme was developed and implemented to prepare Approved Sponsors for the arrival of sponsored refugees.


CORS PROGRAMME MANA WHENUA ENGAGEMENT

COMMUNITY INCLUSION

MANA WHENUA **ENGAGEMENT**

In July 2023, Jay Hikuleo joined HOST as the Kaiārahi Cultural Advisor. Her work to date has included:

- Developing a bicultural framework and deepening tikanga practices.
- Fostering and strengthening relationships with tangata whenua.
- Offering coaching and training for Approved Sponsors as they engage with tangata whenua, te ao and mātauranga Māori.

Following HOST's haka powhiri at Waiwhetū Marae with Te Āti Awa Taranaki Whanui ki Te Upoko o Te Ika Trust, we continued to nurture and expand our relationships with tangata whenua throughout the motu. This was to support and facilitate local engagement within the CORS programme.

We also offered a series of Ako wānanga training sessions on te ao Māori and bicultural relations for interested community partners.

• In conclusion we face more complex challenges and a much greater demand on the protection system, requiring both, an enduring commitment to resettlement. as well as, the additionality of complementary pathwavs that embrace the enrichment that refugees could bring to countries that welcome them — labor mobility pathways that enable economic selfsufficiency, and add to the vitality of economies (win-win), educational pathways, which upskill refugees and build socially cohesive societies (winwin) — we must acknowledge that the protection needs of refugees are diverse. and a one-size-fits-all approach will rarely be sufficient; and, barriers such as travel documents and visas and bureaucratic redtape, must be overcome, to fully realize the promise of complementary pathwavs."
